18-036-46 PAUL'S ACCUSATION AND DEFENSE

:42 After the opening prayer the audio tape had a malfunction and some of the material was inaudible. Terry was saying that the remaining chapters in Acts 24-28 could be considered a series of circumstances in Paul's life and could be taken together. The audio begins abruptly.

:42- 3:40 Some background comments to set the context.

3:40 Acts 23:23-35 Reading and teaching for setting the scene.

7:35 Acts 24:1-9 Reading and Teaching. Paul was in trouble because the world and the Jews could not live with the truth of God's real will. First charge – verse 5 – he was a troublemaker in that he stirred up people.

14:40 Matthew 16:24 The world often reacted to the message Jesus proclaimed in the same way that they reacted to Paul's preaching. Reference Luke 14:26 – Jesus is first, everything else is of lower priority. Whenever God's word is proclaimed with boldness there is opposition. The temptation of preachers is to water down the sharpness of the message and that was what Paul refused to do. The true message of God is offensive to the flesh. We must not translate that to mean that we as people are to be offensive.

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18:15 Acts 24:5 Second charge – He is a ringleader of the sect of the Nazarenes. Third charge – He tried to desecrate the Temple. Reference Acts 21:28-29.

19:00 Acts 24:6-14 Reading and teaching. The distinction of being whole or in part – catholic vs. sectarian. We have a tendency to try and add things on to the essentials of Christianity – take the phrases "Spirit Filled" and "Born Again" as examples. Reference Romans 8:9. Reference Ezekiel 36:26-27. Reference John 14:16-17. Reference 1 Corinthians 6:19. Reference John 3:3-5.

26:50 Acts 24:14-16 Paul attests to the same foundation of faith that the Jews proclaimed. No new testament yet. Faith comes from hearing. Reference Romans 10:14-17.

Paul makes note that he strives to keep his conscience clear before God and man. Reference Acts 23:1.

33:20 1 Timothy 4:1-2 The absence of God causes the conscience to become seared as with a hot iron. Continued rejection of God's attempts (through you conscience), to cause repentance in your life, will result in a hardness of your heart. In the matter of salvation it is called the unforgivable sin. Reference Matthew 12:31-32. Reference Genesis 6:3 "my Spirit shall not always strive with man."

God is always ready to forgive, but it is possible for a person to lose the ability to repent.

37:15 Acts 24:16-21 Paul says he strives to keep his conscience clear before God and before man. Verse 21 – Paul knows how to create a debate among the Pharisees and Sadducees. Reference Acts 23:6-10

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40:00 Acts 24:22-27 Paul spoke to Felix and Drusilla about Righteousness, Self Control and Judgment and that was more than Felix wanted to take in.

This ends Fr. Fullam's teaching on the book of Acts. Terry left St. Paul's later in the year and never was able to teach on chapters 25-28. So sorry, but the series has been so complete that there remains very little to add.

<u>Acts 23:23</u> Then he called two of his centurions and ordered them, "Get ready a detachment of two hundred soldiers, seventy horsemen and two hundred spearmen to go to Caesarea at nine tonight. <u>24</u> Provide mounts for Paul so that he may be taken safely to Governor Felix."

Acts 23:25 He wrote a letter as follows:

Acts 23:26 Claudius Lysias,

To His Excellency, Governor Felix:

Greetings.

Acts 23:27 This man was seized by the Jews and they were about to kill him, but I came with my troops and rescued him, for I had learned that he is a Roman citizen. <u>28</u> I wanted to know why they were accusing him, so I brought him to their Sanhedrin. <u>29</u> I found that the accusation had to do with questions about their law, but there was no charge against him that deserved death or imprisonment. <u>30</u> When I was informed of a plot to be carried out against the man, I sent him to you at once. I also ordered his accusers to present to you their case against him.

<u>Acts 23:31</u> So the soldiers, carrying out their orders, took Paul with them during the night and brought him as far as Antipatris. <u>32</u> The next day they let the cavalry go on with him, while they returned to the barracks. <u>33</u> When the cavalry arrived in Caesarea, they delivered the letter to the governor and handed Paul over to him. <u>34</u> The governor read the letter and asked what province he was from. Learning that he was from Cilicia, <u>35</u> he said, "I will hear your case when your accusers get here." Then he ordered that Paul be kept under guard in Herod's palace.

<u>Acts 24:1</u> Five days later the high priest Ananias went down to Caesarea with some of the elders and a lawyer named Tertullus, and they brought their charges against Paul before the governor. <u>2</u> When Paul was called in, Tertullus presented his case before Felix: "We have enjoyed a long period of peace under you, and your foresight has brought about reforms in this nation. <u>3</u> Everywhere and in every way, most excellent Felix, we acknowledge this with profound gratitude. <u>4</u> But in order not to weary you further, I would request that you be kind enough to hear us briefly.

<u>Acts 24:5</u> "We have found this man to be a troublemaker, stirring up riots among the Jews all over the world. He is a ringleader of the Nazarene sect <u>6</u> and even tried to desecrate the temple; so we seized him. <u>8</u> By examining him yourself you will be able to learn the truth about all these charges we are bringing against him."

<u>Acts 24:9</u> The Jews joined in the accusation, asserting that these things were true.

Matt. 16:24 Then Jesus said to his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me.

Luke 14:26 "If anyone comes to me and does not hate his father and mother, his wife and children, his brothers and sisters—yes, even his own life—he cannot be my disciple.

<u>Acts 24:5</u> "We have found this man to be a troublemaker, stirring up riots among the Jews all over the world. He is a ringleader of the Nazarene sect

<u>Acts 21:28</u> shouting, "Men of Israel, help us! This is the man who teaches all men everywhere against our people and our law and this place. And besides, he has brought Greeks into the temple area and defiled this holy place." <u>29</u> (They had previously seen Trophimus the Ephesian in the city with Paul and assumed that Paul had brought him into the temple area.)

<u>Acts 24:6</u> and even tried to desecrate the temple; so we seized him. <u>8</u> By examining him yourself you will be able to learn the truth about all these charges we are bringing against him."

<u>Acts 24:9</u> The Jews joined in the accusation, asserting that these things were true.

<u>Acts 24:10</u> When the governor motioned for him to speak, Paul replied: "I know that for a number of years you have been a judge over this nation; so I gladly make my defense. <u>11</u> You can easily verify that no more than twelve days ago I went up to Jerusalem to worship. <u>12</u> My accusers did not find me

arguing with anyone at the temple, or stirring up a crowd in the synagogues or anywhere else in the city. <u>13</u> And they cannot prove to you the charges they are now making against me. <u>14</u> However, I admit that I worship the God of our fathers as a follower of the Way, which they call a sect. I believe everything that agrees with the Law and that is written in the Prophets,

<u>Rom. 8:9</u> You, however, are controlled not by the sinful nature but by the Spirit, if the Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he does not belong to Christ.

<u>Ezek. 36:26</u> I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. <u>27</u> And I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws.

John 14:16 And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counselor to be with you forever— <u>17</u> the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you.

<u>1Cor. 6:19</u> Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own;

John 3:3 In reply Jesus declared, "I tell you the truth, no one can see the kingdom of God unless he is born again."

John 3:4 "How can a man be born when he is old?" Nicodemus asked. "Surely he cannot enter a second time into his mother's womb to be born!"

John 3:5 Jesus answered, "I tell you the truth, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless he is born of water and the Spirit.

<u>Acts 24:14</u> However, I admit that I worship the God of our fathers as a follower of the Way, which they call a sect. I believe everything that agrees with the Law and that is written in the Prophets, <u>15</u> and I have the same hope in God as these men, that there will be a resurrection of both the righteous and the wicked. <u>16</u> So I strive always to keep my conscience clear before God and man.

<u>Rom. 10:14</u> How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? <u>15</u> And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

<u>Rom. 10:16</u> But not all the Israelites accepted the good news. For Isaiah says, "Lord, who has believed our message?" <u>17</u> Consequently, faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ.

<u>Acts 23:1</u> Paul looked straight at the Sanhedrin and said, "My brothers, I have fulfilled my duty to God in all good conscience to this day."

<u>1Tim. 4:1</u> The Spirit clearly says that in later times some will abandon the faith and follow deceiving spirits and things taught by demons. <u>2</u> Such teachings come through hypocritical liars, whose consciences have been seared as with a hot iron.

Matt. 12:31 And so I tell you, every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven men, but the blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven. <u>32</u> Anyone who speaks a word against the Son of Man will be forgiven, but anyone who speaks against the Holy Spirit will not be forgiven, either in this age or in the age to come.

<u>Gen. 6:3</u> Then the LORD said, "My Spirit will not contend with man forever, for he is mortal; his days will be a hundred and twenty years."

Acts 24:16 So I strive always to keep my conscience clear before God and man.

<u>Acts 24:17</u> "After an absence of several years, I came to Jerusalem to bring my people gifts for the poor and to present offerings. <u>18</u> I was ceremonially clean when they found me in the temple courts doing this. There was no crowd with me, nor was I involved in any disturbance. <u>19</u> But there are some Jews from the province of Asia, who ought to be here before you and bring charges if they have anything against me. <u>20</u> Or these who are here should state what crime they found in me when I stood before the Sanhedrin— <u>21</u> unless it was this one thing I shouted as I stood in their presence: 'It is concerning the resurrection of the dead that I am on trial before you today.'" <u>Acts 23:6</u> Then Paul, knowing that some of them were Sadducees and the others Pharisees, called out in the Sanhedrin, "My brothers, I am a Pharisee, the son of a Pharisee. I stand on trial because of my hope in the resurrection of the dead." <u>7</u> When he said this, a dispute broke out between the Pharisees and the Sadducees, and the assembly was divided. <u>8</u> (The Sadducees say that there is no resurrection, and that there are neither angels nor spirits, but the Pharisees acknowledge them all.)

<u>Acts 23:9</u> There was a great uproar, and some of the teachers of the law who were Pharisees stood up and argued vigorously. "We find nothing wrong with this man," they said. "What if a spirit or an angel has spoken to him?" <u>10</u> The dispute became so violent that the commander was afraid Paul would be torn to pieces by them. He ordered the troops to go down and take him away from them by force and bring him into the barracks.

Acts 24:22 Then Felix, who was well acquainted with the Way, adjourned the proceedings. "When Lysias the commander comes," he said, "I will decide your case." 23 He ordered the centurion to keep Paul under guard but to give him some freedom and permit his friends to take care of his needs.

<u>Acts 24:24</u> Several days later Felix came with his wife Drusilla, who was a Jewess. He sent for Paul and listened to him as he spoke about faith in Christ Jesus. <u>25</u> As Paul discoursed on righteousness, self-control and the judgment to come, Felix was afraid and said, "That's enough for now! You may leave. When I find it convenient, I will send for you." <u>26</u> At the same time he was hoping that Paul would offer him a bribe, so he sent for him frequently and talked with him.

Acts 24:27 When two years had passed, Felix was succeeded by Porcius Festus, but because Felix wanted to grant a favor to the Jews, he left Paul in prison.
