- :00 4:05 Review of historical context Paul and the cities in Greece.
 - 4:05 1 Thessalonians 2:1-2 Teaching
- 6:45 Acts 16:11-34 With Paul were Silas, Timothy and Luke. Paul tells of the conversion of the first European Lydia. Also the encounter with a possessed slave girl. Significant opposition and they wound up in jail. Teaching on Paul's attitude regarding the interruption of his ministry. The jailer is saved.
- 12:55 Acts 16:35-17:1 Released from prison, Paul makes the point that he was illegally treated, since he was a Roman citizen.
- 14:35 1 Thessalonians 2:2 we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in the face of great opposition. Teaching Reference John 16:33 In the world you will have tribulation. "Courage" Paul knew he was called by God to go forth.
- 17:55 Romans 1:1-4 Paul makes the point that the teaching about Jesus, the Messiah, is all throughout the Old Testament. Jesus is the fulfillment of the prophecies.

- 21:10 2 Corinthians 4:5 What we preach is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord. Jesus is the subject of the scripture. Reference Luke 24:25-27 Jesus teaches the two disciples on the road to Emmaus what the Old Testament said about him. Reference John 5:37-40,46 Jesus said the scriptures testify to him. Jesus said, Moses wrote about me.
- 24:05 Romans 1:5-6 Paul was steadfast because he knew he had received grace and apostleship to bring about obedience of faith.
- 25:20 1 Thessalonians 2:3 Paul is not in error, nor is he trying to make money or work any other agenda. No deception.
- 27:25 2 Corinthians 4:1-2 Paul knows his ministry is of the Lord's doing. Paul attests to his integrity in presenting the gospel. He presents the truth and appeals to each man's conscience.
- 31:40 1 Thessalonians 2:4 but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not to please men, but to please God who tests our hearts. Teaching the greatest occupational hazard for those doing God's work is the constant temptation to please men.
- 34:50 1 Thessalonians 2:5-6 Paul did not use flattery to gain the favor of men. The using of words to try and get what you want from people. Terry says that one of the most immoral books he has ever encountered is *How to win friends and influence people* by Dale Carnegie.

- 40:35 1 Thessalonians 2:7-8 "gentle among you "out of love. Reference Galatians 5:22-23 Fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Not only personal virtues but virtues of genuine ministry as well.
- 44:00 1 Thessalonians 2:9-12 Teaching. Reference 1 Timothy 5:18 for the scripture says, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it is treading out the grain," and, "The laborer deserves his wages. Reference Titus 1:10-11 There are some who minister for what they can get out of it.
- 47:10 1 Corinthians 9:3-12 Paul responds to some who questioned his receipt of support for his ministry. Paul makes the case for support. Reference 1 Corinthians 9:15-19 Paul, even though he has the right to support, nevertheless makes no demands on the Corinthians.
- 50:15 2 Corinthians 11:7-9 Paul did accept money from others who were happy to give it to him, but he did not want to receive support from those who were reluctant.
- 52:10 1 Thessalonians 2:10-12 Paul encourages them to lead a life worthy of the Lord. Our witness is either edifying; or it is a blemish to some. Reference Ephesians 4:1 Lead a life worthy of your calling. Teaching on living in the kingdom, under the authority of Christ.
- 55:35 2 Peter 1:3 His divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who called us to his own glory and excellence, Teaching.

<u>1Th. 2:1</u> For you yourselves know, brethren, that our visit to you was not in vain; <u>2</u> but though we had already suffered and been shamefully treated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in the face of great opposition.

Acts 16:11 Setting sail therefore from Troas, we made a direct voyage to Samothrace, and the following day to Ne-apolis, 12 and from there to Philippi, which is the leading city of the district of Macedonia, and a Roman colony. We remained in this city some days; 13 and on the sabbath day we went outside the gate to the riverside, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had come together. 14 One who heard us was a woman named Lydia, from the city of Thyatira, a seller of purple goods, who was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to give heed to what was said by Paul. 15 And when she was baptized, with her household, she besought us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come to my house and stay." And she prevailed upon us.

Acts 16:16 As we were going to the place of prayer, we were met by a slave girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners much gain by soothsaying. 17 She followed Paul and us, crying, "These men are servants of the Most High God, who proclaim to you the way of salvation." 18 And this she did for many days. But Paul was annoyed, and turned and said to the spirit, "I charge you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour.

Acts 16:19 But when her owners saw that their hope of gain was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the market place before the rulers; 20 and when they had brought them to the magistrates they said, "These men are Jews and they are disturbing our city. 21 They advocate customs which it is not lawful for us Romans to accept or practice." 22 The crowd joined in attacking them; and the magistrates tore the garments off them and gave orders to beat them with rods. 23 And when they had inflicted many blows upon them, they threw them into prison, charging the jailer to keep them safely. 24 Having received this charge, he put them into the inner prison and fastened their feet in the stocks.

Acts 16:25 But about midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them, 26 and suddenly there was a

great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and every one's fetters were unfastened. 27 When the jailer woke and saw that the prison doors were open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, supposing that the prisoners had escaped. 28 But Paul cried with a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." 29 And he called for lights and rushed in, and trembling with fear he fell down before Paul and Silas, 30 and brought them out and said, "Men, what must I do to be saved?" 31 And they said, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." 32 And they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all that were in his house. 33 And he took them the same hour of the night, and washed their wounds, and he was baptized at once, with all his family. 34 Then he brought them up into his house, and set food before them; and he rejoiced with all his household that he had believed in God. 35 But when it was day, the magistrates sent the police, saying, "Let those men go." 36 And the jailer reported the words to Paul, saying, "The magistrates have sent to let you go; now therefore come out and go in peace." 37 But Paul said to them, "They have beaten us publicly, uncondemned, men who are Roman citizens, and have thrown us into prison; and do they now cast us out secretly? No! let them come themselves and take us out." 38 The police reported these words to the magistrates, and they were afraid when they heard that they were Roman citizens; 39 so they came and apologized to them. And they took them out and asked them to leave the city. 40 So they went out of the prison, and visited Lydia; and when they had seen the brethren, they exhorted them and departed.

Acts 17:1 Now when they had passed through Amphipolis and Apollonia, they came to Thessalonica, where there was a synagogue of the Jews.

<u>1Th. 2:2</u> but though we had already suffered and been shamefully treated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in the face of great opposition.

John 16:33 I have said this to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world."

Rom. 1:1 Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God $\underline{2}$ which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, $\underline{3}$ the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from

David according to the flesh <u>4</u> and designated Son of God in power according to the Spirit of holiness by his resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord,

2Cor. 4:5 For what we preach is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, with ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake.

<u>Luke 24:25</u> And he said to them, "O foolish men, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! <u>26</u> Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" <u>27</u> And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself.

John 5:37 And the Father who sent me has himself borne witness to me. His voice you have never heard, his form you have never seen; 38 and you do not have his word abiding in you, for you do not believe him whom he has sent. 39 You search the scriptures, because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that bear witness to me; 40 yet you refuse to come to me that you may have life.

John 5:46 If you believed Moses, you would believe me, for he wrote of me.

<u>Rom. 1:5</u> through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith for the sake of his name among all the nations, <u>6</u> including yourselves who are called to belong to Jesus Christ;

1Th. 2:3 For our appeal does not spring from error or uncleanness, nor is it made with guile;

<u>2Cor. 4:1</u> Therefore, having this ministry by the mercy of God, we do not lose heart. <u>2</u> We have renounced disgraceful, underhanded ways; we refuse to practice cunning or to tamper with God's word, but by the open statement of the truth we would commend ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God.

<u>1Th. 2:4</u> but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not to please men, but to please God who tests our hearts. <u>5</u> For we never used either words of flattery, as you know, or a cloak

for greed, as God is witness; <u>6</u> nor did we seek glory from men, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. <u>7</u> But we were gentle among you, like a nurse taking care of her children. <u>8</u> So, being affectionately desirous of you, we were ready to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you had become very dear to us.

- <u>Gal. 5:22</u> But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, <u>23</u> gentleness, self-control; against such there is no law.
- 1Th. 2:9 For you remember our labor and toil, brethren; we worked night and day, that we might not burden any of you, while we preached to you the gospel of God. 10 You are witnesses, and God also, how holy and righteous and blameless was our behavior to you believers; 11 for you know how, like a father with his children, we exhorted each one of you and encouraged you and charged you 12 to lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory.
- 1Tim. 5:18 for the scripture says, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it is treading out the grain," and, "The laborer deserves his wages."
- <u>Titus 1:10</u> For there are many insubordinate men, empty talkers and deceivers, especially the circumcision party; <u>11</u> they must be silenced, since they are upsetting whole families by teaching for base gain what they have no right to teach.
- 1Cor. 9:3 This is my defense to those who would examine me. 4 Do we not have the right to our food and drink? 5 Do we not have the right to be accompanied by a wife, as the other apostles and the brothers of the Lord and Cephas? 6 Or is it only Barnabas and I who have no right to refrain from working for a living? 7 Who serves as a soldier at his own expense? Who plants a vineyard without eating any of its fruit? Who tends a flock without getting some of the milk?
- 1Cor. 9:8 Do I say this on human authority? Does not the law say the same? 9 For it is written in the law of Moses, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it is treading out the grain." Is it for oxen that God is concerned? 10 Does he not

speak entirely for our sake? It was written for our sake, because the plowman should plow in hope and the thresher thresh in hope of a share in the crop. 11 If we have sown spiritual good among you, is it too much if we reap your material benefits? 12 If others share this rightful claim upon you, do not we still more?

Nevertheless, we have not made use of this right, but we endure anything rather than put an obstacle in the way of the gospel of Christ. 13 Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? 14 In the same way, the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel.

1Cor. 9:15 But I have made no use of any of these rights, nor am I writing this to secure any such provision. For I would rather die than have any one deprive me of my ground for boasting. 16 For if I preach the gospel, that gives me no ground for boasting. For necessity is laid upon me. Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel! 17 For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. 18 What then is my reward? Just this: that in my preaching I may make the gospel free of charge, not making full use of my right in the gospel.

1Cor. 9:19 For though I am free from all men, I have made myself a slave to all, that I might win the more.

<u>2Cor. 11:7</u> Did I commit a sin in abasing myself so that you might be exalted, because I preached God's gospel without cost to you? <u>8</u> I robbed other churches by accepting support from them in order to serve you. <u>9</u> And when I was with you and was in want, I did not burden any one, for my needs were supplied by the brethren who came from Macedonia. So I refrained and will refrain from burdening you in any way.

<u>1Th. 2:10</u> You are witnesses, and God also, how holy and righteous and blameless was our behavior to you believers; <u>11</u> for you know how, like a father with his children, we exhorted each one of you and encouraged you and charged you <u>12</u> to lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory.
